

Dear Parents and Carers,

Discover what our students and children enjoy

As parents and teachers, if you want to get closer to your children, you have to be able to have a conversation about things they care about.

When I first started teaching, the students I was working with loved Paul Jennings as a writer and his books. We all adored his short stories that lead the reader through an unusual series of events and usually an ending with a twist.

The first thing I did was read the books they were particularly interested in, and I found enjoyment in the stories, even though it would not have been my initial choice. The students who were familiar with the book jumped into wonderful conversations and those who hadn't read the book became interested and wanted to find out more. I could feel instantly that I was more connected to those students.

As parents and educators, we need to make sure we know who we are teaching and raising, and we need to make sure our eyes and minds are open to who they are, where they are in their lives, and the ways in which we can become closer to them through what they love. To enable the young people at Chapman PS thrive in every aspect.

Over the latter part of this week I have had the pleasure of joining our year 3 students attend camp at Birrigai Outdoor School. Throughout the two days working as a team member the year 3 students developed an enhanced value of self and others. We all experienced a range of individual challenges and opportunities to take measured personal risks offered through various challenges to us all. - The Board was thrilled to hear the wonderful news of the birth of a healthy baby girl, Hazel, for Mr and Mrs Robson. Congratulations on this wonderful news.
- Following an assessment by Transport Canberra on Thursday 8 June reviewing the traffic control measures investigating traffic movement at pick up and drop- off times, the school was found to be fully compliant. The Board endorsed continued messaging and education about safe behaviours by parents, students and the school community at busy periods around pickup and drop off.
- The Board was pleased to hear that final approval was received for commencement of much needed capital works to the administration areas of the school. Works are due to commence late term 3 with a planned completion date during term 1 2024.
- Update regarding school work's. Created half-court basketball court near sunlight centre, new opening windows in year 6 and library office, test and tagged the whole school and line marking in car park

If you do not receive the survey invitation, please check your junk email folder; if it is not there, please contact your school. If you do not have an email listed with the school, please contact the school front office.

The Parents and Carers Survey will be available online in other languages: Arabic, Burmese, Chinese, Hindi, Korean, Urdu, Vietnamese, Punjabi, Bengali, Spanish, Telugu, French and Italian. Respondents can select their preferred language when they start the survey. A shortened paper-version of the Parents and Carers Survey is also available in the following 5 languages: Dari, Dinka, Farsi, Karen and Mon. These surveys are available at the front office.

For the results to reflect the opinions of our whole school community, we need as many parents and carers, staff and students as possible to complete the survey. Your feedback is important, and we hope you will take part.

To begin our investigation, we determined what we know about plants, and what we want to learn. Here are some of our wonderings:

We will use our inquiry skills to try answer some of our questions.



We want to answer these questions by growing and nurturing plants in the classroom. We filled our cup with soil, put a broad bean seed in it, and watered it.

Some children chose to put their plant inside, some chose to put it outside. We will be recording their growth and are excited to watch them turn into broad beans!

Learning HQ

This term in Learning HQ students are participating in short bursts of fitness each day along with longer PE sessions throughout the week focusing on soccer skills.

Daily fitness favourites so far are PE with Joe, Go Noodle and dancing. Why not ask your child to share these with you at home?







Health Unit -Balanced Bodies.


In Year 1, we have been learning about how we can keep our bodies balanced by making healthy and active choices.

We observed how our bodies felt when they were still and calm vs after doing a 7-minute HIIT workout








We also observed how important it is to wash our hands with an increasingly disgusting experiment watching bread get mouldier and mouldier.










Students in year 4 have been writing persuasive letters to someone in the school about a sustainability topic.


Students used a cartesian plane to create artworks this week.

















How to Handle Tantrums and Meltdowns

This week's resource comes from the **Child Mind Institute**, an organisation dedicated to transforming the lives of children and families struggling with mental health and learning disorders: https://childmind.org/. To help a child who is having a meltdown, we need to understand what might be causing the reaction. Their response might look like fear, anger, frustration, or something else. Of course, our children don't respond in the way an adult would, by talking or asking for what they want. Instead, they may cry, argue, or yell. If an adult gives in, then children may not learn healthy ways to have their needs met. Our goal as the supportive adults in their lives is to get children to respond in positive ways when they are experiencing a challenge. If you can identify the trigger, you can come up with a plan to avoid them. Is it happening when it's time to do homework, or time to get ready for bed? Can you build in more brain or movement breaks during homework time (a little bit like what they experience during their school day), or start an enjoyable, bonding bedtime routine (most children love a bedtime story).
